Driving to your cruise departure port

This is one topic I hear debated often. Being able to drive to the cruise port is a personal preference for me, because it makes so many aspects of the cruise experience much easier. Of course driving to cruise departure points may not always be as practical as desired.

The debate over flying in or driving in has proponents from all corners. No one side is completely right with the others wrong, it is a function of different points of view. There is also the reality that more often than not as people want to see different parts of the world by cruise ship they will have to travel by plane at least some of the time. Not all destinations are within an easy drive for most of the population. Most US based cruisers tend to cruise out of US based ports and that is where there is a focus on driving to the ports. For many people being able to quickly drive to the port makes getting to and from the ship a much simpler process.

days with luggage fees and weight restrictions. Fewer flights often flying much fuller than in the past all come together to make people more aware of alternative ways to get to the cruise.

For those who live within five or six hours from a cruise port, often it is actually almost as quick to drive from your house as it is to drive to a nearby airport, fly, and then transfer to the cruise port. For this population the decision to drive or fly is often almost exclusively a function of how much luggage is going along with expense of driving versus flying. Driving almost always wins out.

A number of folks are wiling to spend a day driving especially when there is a family going because of the expected cost savings generated by driving instead of flying. Of course driving for a day to get to the cruise pretty much as with flying requires driving in the day before the cruise and an obligatory pre-departure hotel stay.

Flying has become more of a hassle these By driving to the port you tend to miss

weather delays that cause aircraft problems. You also have the ability to pretty much take whatever luggage you want with you. The added perk of lots of luggage is that on return you can bring back lots of duty free booze without having to worry about it being smashed by baggage handlers at the airport on the flight home. You can better control when you head to the ship or get off the ship on return to the cruise terminal.

The control and cost savings have led to many indiviudals deciding that driving is the only way to go regardless of the amount of time they have to spend driving. For others time is too valuable to be spent in a car so they opt to go via plane and just deal with the luggage restrictions etc. Personally I've gone by car and plane, even out of the same ports. There are benefits to both sides, but having a car and knowing I will get there is always a bit more comforting, at least until the plan lands safely at the cruise departure port.
